What is SOAR?

- SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery
- A model for assisting eligible adults and children to apply for Social Security Administration (SSA) disability benefits
- For individuals who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness and have a serious mental illness, cooccurring substance use disorder, or other physical disabilities
- Sponsored by SAMHSA in collaboration with the Social Security Administration (SSA) since 2005
- All 50 states and Washington, DC currently participate



The Basics



SSI/SSDI Eligibility: SSA's Definition of Disability

- The law defines disability as:
 - The inability to engage in any substantial gainful activity (SGA = \$1470/month for 2023)
 - By reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment(s)
 - Which can be expected to result in death, or which has lasted or can be expected to last for a continuous period of not less than 12 months.

Establishing Facts to Dispel Myths

- FACT: A person can apply for benefits while incarcerated
- FACT: Prior history of incarceration alone does not make someone (in)eligible for benefits
- FACT: Warrants (other than escape) should not hinder a person from applying or receiving payment



SSI and SSDI: The Basics

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)


- Eligibility based on need: low income and resources; living arrangement
- Monthly amount based on Federal Benefit Rate: \$783/month (2020)*
- Date of eligibility based on Protective Filing Date/Application Date
- Health insurance: Medicaid

Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI)

- Eligibility based on insured status (FICA payments)
- Monthly amount based on earnings history
- Date of eligibility based on "date of onset" of disability, 5 month waiting period
- Health insurance: Medicare




SOAR Eligibility: Decision Tree





The Sequential Evaluation for Adults






Step 3 is Key!

- Person can be found disabled at Step 3 and begin receiving benefits
- If adequate evidence is presented that impairment meets or equals the Listings and the applicant is unable to work
- Connecting functional limitations to their inability to maintain work at a substantial gainful level, using appropriate medical documentation, is key



SSA Benefits for People that are Incarcerated



- Specialty Courts take a collaborative approach to
 - engage participants in long-term treatment,
 - agree to court supervision, and
 - divert from traditional court proceedings.
- It is important to understand what happens when beneficiaries become incarcerated.

Receiving Benefits: Supplemental Security Income

Incarceration Time	Effect on Benefits	Action Needed Upon Release
< 1 full calendar month	No effect	N/A
1 - 12 calendar months	Suspended	Can be reinstated upon release
12+ consecutive calendar months	Terminated	Must reapply*

^{*}As a general rule, reapplication can be made 30 days prior to expected release date but benefits cannot begin until release. With a pre-release agreement, this time can be extended to 120 days prior to release.



Receiving Benefits: Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI)

Incarceration Time	Effect on Benefits	Action Needed Upon Release
< 30 days	No effect	N/A
> 30 days* *convicted and confined	Suspended	Can be reinstated upon release



^{*}Recipients are eligible to continue receiving their benefits until they are convicted of a criminal offense and confined to a penal institution for more than 30 continuous days.

Pre-Release Applications

- New applications can be made prior to release
- The general rule is 30 days prior to the expected release date
- Pre-release agreements between SSA and the institution can be extended to as many as 120 days prior to release

SOAR and Jail Collaboration: Davidson County

- Davidson County, Tennessee SOAR DCSO (Department of Corrections/Sheriff's Office)
- Collaboration through the Mayor's Office of Innovation, Sheriff's Office, and Metro Social Services
- Initiative within the Jail was established July 2014
- Sole mission of SOAR at DCSO:
 - Assist incarcerated individuals with a severe and persistent mental illness who are without income and/or experiencing homelessness to re-enter into society
- Outcomes: 89% of applications apps
- roved in average of 48 day





Criminal Justice Services-Forensic Evaluations Unit





- Mecklenburg County, NC 6 SOAR Trained staff at Criminal Justice Services (Forensic Evaluations Unit, Reentry Services, Treatment Court)
- 2 SOAR Trained staff at Jail Inmate Services
- 2 SOAR Trained Social Workers at the Public Defender's Office
- All working in collaboration with SOAR trained community partners



Success: Miami/Dade, Florida

- Diversion courts, in-reach initiatives, reentry planning, and SOAR trained corrections staff
- Reduces recidivism, prevents incarceration, saves money



Miami / Dade Jail Diversion Program

- Housing and treatment provided upon release based on likelihood of SSI approval
- Recidivism dropped from 70 to 22 percent comparing the year before and after SSI approval; demonstrated \$7 million in savings to the State of Florida

SOAR and Prison Collaboration: Oklahoma

- Funded by the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services
- Oklahoma Department of Corrections staff trained to assist with accessing public benefits, e.g. SSI/SSDI
- Built and nurtured relationships with state and federal partners
 - Held regular meetings with all stakeholders
- Collaboration on 4 federal re-entry grants
 - These grants target people with co-occurring disorders
 - Also includes applying for public benefits when applicable
- Over the past 11 years, approval rates have been >80%

What we already know....

- People with mental illnesses remain in jail eight times longer than other offenders at a cost that is seven times higher (Mental Health America, 2008).
- At least three quarters of incarcerated individuals with mental illness have a co-occurring substance use disorder (Council of State Governments, 2012).
- More than 20 percent of prisoners with mental illness experienced homelessness in the months before their incarceration, compared with 10 percent of the general prison population (Greenberg & Rosenheck, 2008).
- The intersection of criminal justice and behavioral health not only affects the justice-involved person but all systems involved in their care (treatment, housing, employment, and supervision).



Yet.... Benefits Acquisition is an Underutilized Reentry Tool

- For eligible individuals, benefits acquisition increases access to income and health insurance and promotes successful reentry
 - Income = Access to housing security
 - Insurance = Access to treatment
 - Housing + Treatment = Reduction in recidivism
 - Reduction in recidivism = Reduced financial burden to states, counties, and agencies



Specialty Court Participation

 Specialty Courts can be used as a tool to avoid the negative impact that incarceration could have for people involved in the legal system that already have their benefits in place.



SOAR Success: Tulsa Treatment Court

- Tulsa Treatment Court
 was able to secure
 funding for a full time
 SOAR specialist to serve
 their clients.
- The specialist was hired July 2023!





Continue SOAR Success in Specialty Courts

- Behaviors that result in the participants' interaction with legal systems may be connected to the symptoms of a diagnosed/undiagnosed mental health issue
 - Substance use may be evidence of other struggles
 - Strong connection between substance use, trauma, and serious mental illness
- We share the same clients!
 - SOAR assistance for individuals within the community that have support from the courts is a great benefit
 - Specialty court participants are encouraged to engage for longer terms which enables SOAR providers to continue engagement to complete the application process
- Using the SOAR model as a resource for specialty court participants can encourage continued treatment (insurance) and address basic needs and housing barriers (income)








Getting Involved with SOAR

You want to be a SOAR provider? That's great! Here's what to expect.

SOAR promotes recovery and wellness through increased access to Social Security disability benefits for eligible individuals who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness and have a serious mental illness, medical impairment, and/or a co-occurring substance use disorder. SOAR providers assist individuals with complete and quality applications. This is not an easy task, and we want to be sure that you understand the commitment required – we believe it is well worth the effort!

Training

The SOAR Online Course trains providers to assist individuals with the Social Security disability application process. The course includes an Adult Curriculum for assisting with Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) claims for adults and a Child Curriculum for assisting with SSI claims for children.

- The SOAR Online Course: Adult and Child Curriculums are free and are located on the SOARWorks website (https://soarworks.prainc.com/content/soar-online-course-catalog).
- Each curriculum consists of seven classes, each of which has a series of articles, short quizzes, and a
 practice case component. The practice case provides an opportunity for trainees to apply what they
 have learned in the course by completing a sample application packet for a fictitious applicant using
 SOAR techniques.
- It takes approximately 20 hours to complete each curriculum and participants can work at their own
 pace, starting and stopping as they wish. However, we encourage students to complete the
 curriculum within 30 days to retain the information learned.
- Upon successful completion, participants will receive 20 CEUs (continuing education units) from the National Association of Social Workers (NASW).

Many SOAR Local Leads offer one-day SOAR Online Course Review Sessions to review key components of the curriculum, discuss local/state practices, and connect new providers to local Social Security Administration (SSA) and DDS (Disability Determination Services) offices.

Time Commitment

We estimate that each SOAR application will take approximately 20-40 hours to complete, from initial engagement to receiving a decision on a claim. This generally occurs over the course of 60-90 days.

The time spent on each application will vary depending on the amount of engagement that is
needed as well as other variables such as the experience level of the SOAR worker. For example,
engagement with an applicant who is residing in an institution may take 20 hours, while it may take
longer to connect with someone who is living outside or difficult to contact.

SOAR Critical Components

SOAR providers with higher approval rates credit their success to implementing the SOAR critical components and submitting high quality applications. Use of these components significantly increases the


