A NOTE ON LANGUAGE & TERMINOLOGY

- Overdose crisis (vs. Opioid Epidemic)
- Drug checking (vs. drug testing)
- Contaminated (vs. laced)
- Illicit fentanyl (vs. fentanyl)
- Substance use (vs. abuse)

OVERDOSE CRISIS, A SNAPSHOT

- 107,622 OD deaths in US in 2021, up 15% from 2020
- Georgia OD deaths up 56% from 2019 to 2021
- April 2021-22, Georgia reported a 17% increase, compared to ~4% nationally (provisional data)

Key features:


- Not an overprescribing crisis anymore
- Not just fentanyl also a steady rise in stimulant, benzo, (ie., polysubstance) involved overdose
- Borders: traditional interdiction efforts not effective
- Increasingly stark racial disparities
- Homelessness crises in cities
- Service gaps in rural areas

(as of Oct 2022)

OVERDOSE PREVENTION & TREATMENT COURTS

Treatment courts are:

- Uniquely positioned, both upstream & downstream
- Well-funded, staffed, and resourced (compared to PH models)
- Offered a wide range of training and education
- Subject to oversight and QA standards (at least in GA)

However, treatment courts cannot:

- Improve a toxic drug supply
- Force everyone to be abstinent, forever
- Correct for all other system failures (housing, healthcare, poverty, etc)





OVERDOSE PREVENTION STRATEGIES (in the US)

Longstanding public health/community-based interventions:

- Syringe Access Services
- Naloxone distribution
- Drug checking kits
- Addiction medicine (MOUD/MAT)

Newer interventions (in some states):

- Overdose Prevention Sites
- Mass spectronomy services
- Never Use Alone hotlines
- Decriminalized 'diverted' buprenorphine



OVERDOSE PREVENTION STRATEGIES (outside the US)

Longstanding interventions:

- Supervised Consumption Sites or Overdose Prevention Centers
 - Injection and (sometimes)
 inhalation infrastructure
 - Provision of sterile supplies and naloxone
 - Provision of sexual health supplies and education
 - Overdose reversal (oxygen and naloxone)

- Onsite counselling and assessment services
- Housing access and support
- Bad drug and date alerts
- Onsite wound and infection care
- Food and cold weather supplies



OVERDOSE PREVENTION STRATEGIES (outside the US)

Longstanding interventions:

- Safer Supply models
 - Agonist therapies (methadone and buprenorphine)
 - Heroin-Assisted Therapy (HAT programs)
 - Hydromorphone prescribing (Canada and Europe)
 - Drug User Union-led distro (BC, Canada)

OVERDOSE PREVENTION & TREATMENT COURTS: DECISION POINTS

- Early Identification & Assessment
- Treatment Planning & Engagement
- Case Management & Supervision
- Phase Advancement
- Program Completion




IDENTIFICATION & ASSESSMENT

Questions for drug court teams:

- How are we identifying/assessing for OD risk factors specifically?
- If necessary, what immediate resources are available in the first interaction?
- Put down the clipboard (i.e., have a human conversation about OD)





THE 'OTHER' SUD: SYSTEM UNDERPERFORMANCE DISORDER

Consider person's history with:

- Schools / teachers
- Child welfare / social workers
- Healthcare / doctors, nurses
- Social services / housing
- Psychiatry / doctors
- Jails and prisons / police
- Courts / judges, lawyers
- Media / journalists, public opinion






FLIPPING THE SCRIPT: SYSTEM *SURVIVORSHIP*

Flipping the script:

- "Mistrusting" ...intuitive
- "Hesitant" ...cautious
- "Unmotivated" ...pragmatic
- "Indifferent" ...protective
- "Ambivalent" ...seeks clarity
- "Overconfident" ...hopeful
- "Challenging" ...passionate
- "Critical" ...has standards






TREATMENT PLANNING & ENGAGEMENT

Questions for drug court teams:

- How can we collab better; 'make room' for treatment hesitancy?
- How do our treatment options impact clinical/cultural fit and safety?
- Can we balance treatment and social goals more effectively?
- Prepare equally for risks associated w/ both treatment completion and breakdown





MEDICATIONS FOR OPIOID USE DISORDER (MOUD/MAT)


Questions for drug court teams:

- Are we treating MOUD as a first line of defense or adjunct?
- What burdens/barriers to MOUD treatment to our participants face? (logistical, informational, philosophical, cultural, etc.)
- Are we unconsciously diminishing or discouraging MOUD-based recovery?

MEDICATIONS FOR OPIOID USE DISORDER (MOUD/MAT)

Results from forthcoming NADCP (Marlowe) research will show:

- 169 drug courts surveyed across the country
- 99% of responding courts offered some form of MOUD
- 73% offered all three FDA-approved medications
- 8% offered Naltrexone only*
- Key finding: only 25% opioid-using drug court participants are using MOUD

*data re OD prevention is inconclusive


CASE MANAGEMENT & SUPERVISION

Questions for drug court teams:

- What program requirements do have that could contribute to OD risk?
- What sanctions do we use that could contribute to OD risk?
- How are measuring success beyond the usual metrics?



CASE MANAGEMENT & SUPERVISION



PHASEADVANCEMENT

Questions for drug court teams:

- As participants progress, how are we preparing for the possible emergence of unresolved trauma/other MH concerns?
- Are we offering phase-specific OD prevention strategies?
- Are we modelling a holistic, nuanced understanding of recovery progress (i.e., not just 'counting days')



PROGRAM COMPLETION/EXIT

Questions for drug court teams:

- Do we have any graduation criteria that could impact OD risk?
- Do our discharge plan protocols include OD prevention strategies?
- How are we framing graduation/program completion?




A NOTE ON 'GRADUATION DAY'

- Replace "you were there, now you're here" storyline with ideas like "you've had these qualities and skills all along" and "your life has always had value, even if it hasn't always felt that way."
- Balance appreciation of the person's concrete achievements and growth with acceptance of their wholeness (i.e., their complex and imperfect integrated self)
- Always highlight the self-directed efforts: "You did this! This belongs to you!"
- Always highlight something your court team has learned from the participant
- Ask ourselves, if they were to struggle again in the future, would they feel too ashamed to come back to us?
- As the saying goes: too much praise or blame takes us away from the center

OD PREVENTION & TREATMENT COURTS: TEAM MEMBER EDUCATION

- Listen to participants
- Naloxone, rescue breathing training
- Drug, set, and setting 101
- Motivational interviewing 101
- Designate team members to
 - ✓ monitor local drug trends/alerts
 - ✓ circulate relevant research or reports
 - ✓ maintain a map of key resources
 - ✓ liaise with local community-based risk reduction agencies



OVERDOSE CRISIS MYTHS & MISINFORMATION:

- All fentanyl is toxic
- Overdose from passive fentanyl exposure (skin and/or inhalation)
- Rainbow-colored drugs, marketing to kids
- 'Naloxone-proof'

INFORMATION >>> FEAR

OD PREVENTION & TREATMENT COURTS: PARTICIPANT EDUCATION

- Survival vs. sobriety
- Drug, set, setting
- Naloxone training
- Drug checking & alerts
- Recurrence of use safety planning
- Community resources






